

Peace and governance 1. Project name: strengthening Governance

to Stabilize Conflict-Affected Areas Year: 2023 Donor:

- 1. As result of trust building and conflict sensitivity workshops, 30 local peace committee capacity and knowledge on conflict sensitivity approaches and joint peace efforts were enhanced, enabling them to provide locally based measures mitigating the intercommunal conflicts, resulting in the return of Goats and camels stolen from both sides.
- 2. Through inter-communal dialogues, SARN sensitised 200 community members on inter-communal relationships and this reduced community mistrust and attitudes towards each other. Promoting positive attitudes among the Borana and Somalis in Sericho and Modogashe.
- 3. Using Sports, Arts, and culture as creative approaches,8(110-member Youth teams) and 8 Women's groups (10 members each) were supported to increase intercommunal connectivity, shared identity, and enhancing culture as a source of resilience. This reduced community perceptions, divisions, and US vs. them narratives.
- 4. The design of the community peace actions (CPAs), supported the 30 peace committee members, county and National representatives a platform to have communal-led conversations in the identification of key drivers, and local-based solutions. Increasing legitimacy of local participation on peacebuilding on conflict resolutions and this increased level of ownership of joint peace actions with the local actors.
- 5. Increased working linkages between the local peace committee and government agencies through the institutionalization of the formulated community peace actions and this informed the need to lobby the integration of local peace actions into the devolved working documents in building resilience against the push and pull factors of conflicts.

Grants

Implemented a project in Mandera-Somalia border community and security officials in understanding and deep-diving on push and pull factors that drives youth vulnerability in joining the extremist networks that had impacted nega- tively on the community's social and economic environment.

The project aimed to strengthen community-led, peacebuilding and countering violent extremism support to prevent youth radicalization, increase trust and collaboration between community members, local government, and security actors,

The activities included training of Trainers for key community influencers and capacity building for civilian government actors and community members in drying the pool of mistrust and on this active community forums established to coordinate local peace actors' initiative.

The project was on under the IDOVE programs in Somalia-Ethipio and AU statesi



Mandera, like many other parts of Northern Kenya, is experiencing a severe threat of violence from the terrorist group, Al-Shabaab. The situation is exac- erbated by the porous border that enables gun smuggling. Another major issue in the border region is the recruitment of young people join these extremist groups. Coupled with unemployment, lack of government services, and an enabling environment for violence, youth are becoming pushed to pledge allegiance and join Al-Shabaab. The border communities have appealed to both governments to prevent and counter-violence extremism. Instead, the use of excessive force by security agencies has further aggravated an already fragile relationship with the local communities. Human rights-based approaches to countering violent extremism are urgently needed. Furthermore, safe dialogue spaces, security, and the community are needed to address widely held misconceptions about one another to improve the relationship.

In addition, climate change has caused prolonged droughts and unpredictable rainfall patterns which have resulted in climate vulnerability disrupting liveli- hoods and exacerbating existing issues. This has led to more people abandon- ing their homes in search of better livelihoods and opportunities in the border- land towns and overseas. In light of these challenges, the project aimed to:

- 1. Strengthen community-led, CVE-relevant support and prevent further radi- calization of at-risk communities in the Mandera context; and
- 2. Increase trust and collaboration between community members and relevant local government and security actors.

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Project: Empowering young Madrassa Sheikhs

against Violence Extremism

Duration: 12months

During our support partnership with the Global Centre on Cooperative Security, we implemented a social cohesion project that was aimed at creating a conversation between the madrasa students and their religious clerics to have ownership of their involvement in community peace-building initiatives while linking and engaging security actors and using the platform to reduce extrajudicial killings against the religious actors and maintain the rule of law for the judicial process, also through the project we established a sports activities that was informed that the religious actors and the local youth have the potential to engage and build peace and social cohesion despite the existing ideological narratives.





Project Achievements

*200 Madrassa youth open discussion on the dangers of violent extremism and

thus break the silence over violent extremism within Islamic circles in Garissa.

Engaged the community in Fafi and Hulugho on conflict-sensitive approaches during the COVID-19 pandemic when there has been some preventive enforcement, surveillance, and movement restrictions and police brutality and therefore it was in this context that SARN in partnership with search for common ground with EU funding had implemented dialogue, capacity building for the community influencers in mapping community existing risks through early warning and early response mechanism and engaging community and security actors through community policing forums that and this engagement result improved community working linkages with the security enforcement officers as they established common ground understanding that they have a shared common goals against the pandemic.
